ARIZONA MUSICFEST 28TH SEASON BRINGS SHOW-STOPPING LINEUP TO THE NORTH VALLEY

The 28th annual Arizona Musicfest festival season brings a diverse lineup of exceptional artists to Valley audiences from country superstar **Wynonna Judd** to legendary music icon **Neil Sedaka**. Arizona Musicfest's 2018-19 Festival Season includes 27 performances from November 2 through March 15.

Festival highlights also include Broadway's leading man, **Brian Stokes Mitchell**; stars of The Venetian Las Vegas, **Human Nature**; jazz trumpet legend **Herb Alpert** and Grammy Award-winning singer **Lani Hall**; and **Lonesome Traveler** with special guest **Peter Yarrow**, of Peter, Paul and Mary, performing a journey through American folk music from the hills of Appalachia to the nightclubs of New York. Stellar ensembles coming to the Musicfest stage include the legendary **Count Basie Orchestra**, as well as swing greats **Big Bad Voodoo Daddy**.

Highlighting this year's **Festival Orchestra Week** are two momentous concerts featuring violin virtuoso **Gil Shaham** and the **Violins of Hope**, a rare collection of restored violins from the Holocaust. **The Festival Orchestra**, under the direction of Maestro Robert Moody, is comprised of musicians from the nation's finest orchestras. This ensemble will perform six concerts in February, including works by Tchaikovsky, Dvorak, Bach, and Mahler. Award-winning American pianist **Andrew von Oeyen** joins the Orchestra for Beethoven's *Piano Concerto No. 3.*

"Arizona Musicfest has experienced tremendous growth over the last few years," said Arizona Musicfest Executive and Producing Director Allan Naplan. "With a continued expansion of our Festival concert programming, including more performances than ever before with top level artists, we look forward to providing another exciting season!"

Neil Sedaka

Festival Sinfonia: Vivaldi & Mozart

The first half also features one of Tchaikovsky's best known works, his lyrical *Serenade for Strings*. Finally, the Sinfonia pairs with the Festival Chorus to perform two harmonically stunning works by famed choral composer Ola Gieilo, as well as the exultant *Benedicite* by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

Festival Orchestra: Beethoven & Dvorak featuring pianist Andrew von Oeyen

Rossini's ebullient Overture to The Barber of Seville begins the concert and Dvorak's Symphony No. 9 "From the New World" concludes the program.

Festival Orchestra: Concert of Triumph

Tchaikovsky's *Capriccio Italien*, a descriptive

portrait of Italy, and Respighi's magnificent *Pines of Rome* transport audiences to the landscape and rhythms of the Eternal City.

The concert also includes Beethoven's *Leonore Overture*, Gustav Mahler's *Totenfeier*, and *Schlof Main Kind, A Yiddish Lullaby* by Allan Naplan.

About Arizona Musicfest: Founded in 1991, Arizona Musicfest, a secular non-profit arts organization based in North Scottsdale, produces an annual concert festival as well as important music education programs, youth performance opportunities and a community lifelong learning series for the Greater Phoenix area. With a commitment to presenting world-class artists in accessible and convenient locations, each season the Festival showcases a diverse line-up of celebrity and distinguished guest musicians, as well as the acclaimed Arizona Musicfest Festival Orchestra under the direction of Maestro Robert Moody. This superlative ensemble features players from the New York Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony, Philadelphia Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, Boston Symphony, the National Symphony, the Metropolitan Opera, and other top US orchestras. The Festival Orchestra is in residency for one week during the annual Festival.

Arizona Musicfest's extensive music education and youth performance programs touch approximately 6,000 children each year. Along with the organization's many in-school programs presented free of charge to five local school districts, over the last three years, Arizona Musicfest has also provided over \$30,000 in free instruments to area schools and has contributed over \$70,000 in college scholarships to local Valley teens pursuing collegiate degrees in music performance.

Arizona Musicfest's six Young Musician Competitions (piano, voice, strings, chamber ensembles, brass and woodwinds) and the related Young Musician Performance Series annually attract some of the brightest young stars from throughout the Valley. For more information, visit azmusicfest.org.
